

Vicar's Letter December 2024 Rev John



'm writing this on the first snowy day we've had this winter. And for some that will make it feel really Christmassy, though it mainly makes me feel a little damp and cold. But for those who get the opportunity being warm inside with decorations up and being able to look out on snow covered trees feels great. There are some really beautiful carols at this time of year, in the Bleak Midwinter, and one of my favourites See

Amid the Winters Snow. Listening to the choir of Kings College sing them they are truly beautiful. We don't know of course but I suspect it wouldn't actually have been snowy at Jesus' birth. Cold and draughty quite possibly but snow, not likely. But yet there is something really important about imagining Jesus coming to us, to where we are at winter, the things which we experience, and the lives we know. 
What sort of a Christmas card person are you?



hat 'beautiful story' tells of a Creator who sent His Son to share the life of His creation, to be born as a helpless baby, to grow up as a man of extraordinary wisdom, gentleness and love, who was executed by the authorities for contradicting the traditions of the time. His followers – who today number about two billion people all over the world – believe that He rose from the dead, and that by His death and resurrection He has made possible forgiveness and eternal life for men

That is certainly quite a story, perhaps the greatest story ever told, and yes, beautiful. And that is the story that will be rehearsed again this Christmas, in children's Nativities, in hymns and carols, in Bible readings and sermons all over the country. People who stay away from church all year turn up to hear it, and who can blame them? This is a story of hope, of love and of heaven touching earth.

Probably the best-known statue in the world is 'Christ the Redeemer', towering over the South American city of Rio de Janeiro, His arms outstretched in blessing. Christmas

celebrates the birth of that great Redeemer – a tiny baby laid in a feeding trough.

His birth changed history, His life transformed our understanding of what it means to be human, His death was at one and the same time a tragedy and a triumph. Yes, it is 'the most beautiful story ever told'. Enjoy it again this Christmas.

December Christmas throughout the

or nearly four weeks leading up to Christmas Christians recognise a period called Advent. It means 'coming'. It is a time of spiritual preparation. 'Coming' refers to Jesus' first coming as a baby, but it also looks forward to a day when Jesus is expected to return in triumph at His 'second coming' to establish perfect justice and a new order of peace.

Originally Christians marked Advent as a time when they refrained from excessive eating and drinking. Then Christmas Day reintroduced them to the joys of feasting. Christmas celebrations lasted for 12 days, with gifts exchanged as a climax at Epiphany (6th January). Today, however, Advent is more likely to be associated with accelerating festivity, with the days following Christmas something of an anti-climax until 'twelfth night', on which decorations are removed. Many Christians worldwide are trying to revive the spirit of Advent by setting aside time to pray and address global poverty.

Christmas Day is celebrated as the anniversary of Jesus' birth, although the actual date is not known. Most Christians celebrate it on 25th December. However, the Orthodox Church (the ancient churches in Eastern Europe and parts of Asia) follows a different calendar and celebrates on 7th January. Christians make a point of taking communion on Christmas Day. Many make it the first thing they do as the clock strikes midnight.

On 6th January the Christmas festival continues with a celebration of Epiphany, which means 'the appearance'. Christians remember the visit of wise men (magi) to Jesus, bringing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. The Christmas tradition of exchanging gifts originally honoured these men, who were the first non-Jews (Gentiles) to worship Jesus. It forms a reminder that in Jesus God was giving Himself for the benefit of the entire world.

Orthodox Christians use this day to recall the baptism of Jesus as a grown man. The significance of Jesus being baptised was that He identified Himself with human beings in all their need. They mark the day by praying for God's blessing on rivers, wells, and water sources.

Christmas has never been just an escapist festival for Christians. Those who treat it seriously recognise that not all the world is able to face the days with frivolity or joy. The day after Christmas, Boxing Day, was historically marked as the feast of St Stephen. He was the first man to be put to death rather than give up his belief that Jesus was God.

And two days later a day remembering the Massacre of the Innocents recalls Herod's attempt to destroy Jesus by killing all male babies in Bethlehem. Although not so widely marked as Christmas Day, it gives Christians the opportunity to pray for children in today's world who suffer as a result of the actions of adults.

The Rainton Meadows Known as "THE MEDDIS "by locals and Pitmen By John Harvey

y childhood playground, and where two family members from our house worked. Tin bath it front of fire, twice daily. Nee modesty then, Nivver washed their backs, said it wakened them, And now nearly 80 years later I can still to this day, smell damp pit clothes drying and warming in front of the fire, that was our only source of heat, and cooking. And hot watta.

Mining in Rainton pre dates the mid 14 century a Norman date is probable, but even older dates are likely.(from the Londonderry Papers) According to The Londonderry Papers the monks of Durham are recorded as owners of Rainton coal pits in 1361 and 1443, With reference to a horse driven winch pump in 1544. And in 1670 the first mention of "Rainton Staiths"

Rainton mine itself can be dated to 1662; it also states that mining around Rainton took place in 1559 with leases running 21 years In 1683 John Duck, (a Durham alderman) took out the Rainton lease from The Dean and Chapter of Durham for the whole area, hence on old maps the pit is called Rainton Old Ducks. In 1688 Wharton took over the lease,, It was then passed on to John Tempest in 1710 and in 1794 it was again passed on to Sir Henry Vane (Vane Tempest) and later on was passed to Lord Londonderry who worked the mine until 1896, It then had a 40 year rest until reopened by the Lambton, Hetton & Joicey Collieries Ltd in April 23th 1936... And it then came under Houghton management and continued under Houghton management after Nationalisation in 1947 until final closure on 25th March 1960.

By 1815 the Rainton Mines (not stated which) were becoming unproductive. So John Buddle decided to close them down, He then started removing the support columns of coal, and allowing the mines to collapse behind, working back towards the shafts. And leaving as little coal as possible. By 1820 this was still in progress .But then in 1822 The Hetton Mining Company proved the feasibility of deep mining coal. Buddle then had a change of plan.

He (John Buddle) then on the behalf of Lord Londonderry decided to concentrate on three new deep shaft mines. The Adventure already sunk in 1817 The Alexandrina sunk in 1824 and The Meadows sunk in 1824 the last to form the centre of the new group. This work was overseen By Buddles agent John Robson who was in charge of the sinking of all three colliery's (from John Robison's Diary)

And so the Rainton collieries passed from John Tempest to Lord Londonderry. To provide accommodation for the miners and their families, Buddle bought a triangular freehold piece of land from Mr. Heaviside, Mid way between West and East Rainton, and had Middle Rainton built on this site in approx 1822 Middle Rainton had either 7 or 8 streets. I cannot remember all the names, but Front Street on the main road had 28 houses, then there was Back Row, about the same, West Row, Cross Street, and Lewis Street and Slate Row. A total of approximately 125 houses with a population of 500 plus inhabitants. There were 3 pubs. Fox & hounds, Rose & Crown and The Foresters Arms.

And was surrounded on all sides by allotments for the miners. The Meadows was Centre to the group with a fine glazed brick shaft and its own coke works. The pit continued in production, under lord Londonderry's ownership until closed in 1896. And had a quiet rest for the next 40 years. And now the Meadows passed from Lord Londonderry to become part of the Lambton, Hetton & Joicey Collieries Ltd under a Houghton Manager and Union Rainton Meadows Colliery. The shaft of which is to be reopened, is one of Lodae. the old Londonderry group. The shaft is now connected by an underground drift with

Houghton Colliery and the purpose of reopening is to enable men working at Houghton to ride at The Meadows and thus save time in getting to their working places as Meadows coal is now being raised from Houghton.


This may have been true at first, about raising coal worked from The Meadows from Houghton. A long way underground but only for a short while until facilities were got working again at The Meado ws and new rail lines, and coal hopper were installed and working. Coal was brought up at the Meadows, and most was transported by rail direct to Fence houses, and Lambton Coke Works.

Coming on now to 1947 and the Nationisation of the coal industry so the Rainton Meadows was taken over from Lambton, Hetton & Joicey Collieries Ltd. By the state and a new sign erected Rainton Meadows N.C. B .But it still retained the same Houghton manager and links. We are now in 1952 and lot of activity for us kids to watch. Very large earth moving machines. They were digging up the old pit heap on the side directly across from the canteen s, going around in a circle and dumping it on the other side. This went on for weeks until they had a large flat area where part of the tip had been. This we were told was to build Pit Head Baths. Building commenced, and on completion invites were sent to visit for the opening ceremony and have a look around. The speeches were not of much interest to us me being 13yrs then. This took place on Saturday 20th February 1954

But the high vertical steam boiler painted bright red certainly caught my interest (in later life I was taught about steam boilers, and later took apprentices on the same subject) well the building was a revelation to me, It was all heated and had changing rooms with separate lockers, sinks to wash your clothes, heated drying rooms, showers, and even a machine with rotating brushes to clean your work boots.

So now you could go to work in decent clothes, change into work clothes, and after work shower and change into clean clothes. But not all the pitmen were that impressed and many refused to use the facility at first. But as time went on most did only the odd few still went home in pit clothes. I suppose it was the older men who after say 40 years washing at home did not want to change old habits

Five years only after the new baths in were opened there was talk of closure this would have been about 1959, Mr Thomas Newton of Houghton Miners Lodge successfully had this rescinded but later that year it was finally decided to close the pit. The Meadows finally



closed in March 3rd 1960. The shafts could have been kept for ventilation or safety purposes. The closed colliery in stood empty for a O MEROON LANC P SPOIL HEAPS @ FOOTPATHS number of years. It was only in Margaret Thatcher's time that all of the remains were totally removed. This records that that 322 men were employed at The Meadows at this time 88 of whom would simply be made redundant, the majority of the other324 men would be found work at either Houghton or other local pits, Also 53 of the men due to • be transferred to Houghton would be retained at The meadows doing salvage work. And the final

tragedy, in 1962 like my home, in Middle Rainton, the very village built in 1822 to provide accommodation for the miners and their families working at the pit, also suffered the same fate. Being totally demolished and like the pit apart from memories lost forever. *The royalties from John's books all go to St Cuthberts Hospice Durham.*





Christmas Tree Decorations



ver the decades the decorations on home Christmas trees have

come and gone. From an eclectic colourful mix of baubles and home-made items when the children were young,

to a radical change to 'contemporary' and 'sophisticated'. It didn't last long, as quite frankly they seemed a bit dull, lifeless and lacking real meaning.

We quite rapidly added mementoes from holiday places to the mix to jazz it up a bit.

In more recent years we've been receiving and proudly displaying creations from the next family generation – so we come back to the start.

How about your tree?

And what about the tree decorations you have in your church? What is the story behind those? Are they identical or very different?

In 1957 at Ascension Lutheran Church, Danville, USA, Frances Kipps Spencer thought that the traditional, brightly coloured Christmas ornaments were not fitting for a worship setting, so she started thinking about a way to reflect the Christian faith through ornaments.



A Christmas tree dubbed the "most humble in the world" has sold at auction for £2,600.

The 103-year-old tree, which is only 31 inches tall with 25 branches and 12 fake berries, fetched well above inital estimations of £60-80. Originally brought in 1920, the artificial tree was gifted to Loughborough resident Dorothy Grant in the aftermath of the First World War. It served as her Christmas tree from when she was eight-years-old until she died in 2014, at the age of 101.

The first ornament was the name of Jesus and His title: Christ. The Greek *Chi* (X) *Rho* (P) is the monogram for the Greek word *Christos* (Christ).

There followed over the years a whole collection symbolising the life of Jesus and is ministry.

These ornaments even have their own name: 'Chrismons,' which comes from the words *Christ* and *monogram*.

Just as wall paintings and stained glass in churches tell the Christian story these Chrismons are a clever way to communicate the same key ideas of the Christian faith particularly to annual church visitors.

Chrismons are white and gold, representing purity and value. When used with an evergreen Christmas tree, symbolising eternal life, and white lights covering the tree, symbolising Jesus as the light of the world the whole gives a story just in its use of colour with no words required.

This month: Have a look at the tree decorations in a church near you. What does the overall effect say? and are there any 'Chrismons' on it?



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
